

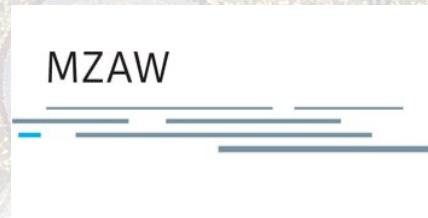
How to get to the Museum für Abgüsse Klassischer Bildwerke München:
